Concealed Carry (Pistol Permit) General Guidelines

- 1. The applicant must be a legal citizen of the United States of America or possess A Permanent Resident Card, and must be a legal citizen of the State of Alabama, and have a primary residence in Baldwin County, Alabama.
- 2. The applicant must have an Alabama Driver's License, an Alabama Identification Card, or an active military identification card.
- 3. The applicant must be at least 18 years of age.
- 4. Who may not obtain a pistol permit in Baldwin County?

Certain people are not allowed to possess a pistol under federal and state law. The Sheriff cannot issue a permit to any person who is prohibited by law from possessing or owning a gun. The following cannot obtain a pistol permit:

- a. Any person who has been convicted of a felony (a crime punishable by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year).
- b. Any person who has been convicted of committing or attempting to commit a crime of violence, including murder, manslaughter (except manslaughter arising from the operation of a vehicle), rape, mayhem, assault with intent to rob, assault with intent to ravish, assault with intent to murder, robbery, distribution of a controlled substance, burglary and kidnapping
- c. Any person who is an unlawful drug user, a drug addict or a habitual drunkard. Factors to consider include repeated and recent arrests or convictions for drug crimes, DUI, and/or public intoxication.
- d. Any person who is under indictment for a crime punishable for imprisonment exceeding one year.
- e. Any person who has been convicted of domestic violence, even if the conviction is a misdemeanor.
- f. Any person discharged from the Armed Forces under dishonorable conditions.
- g. Any person who has been adjudicated as a mental defective or who has been committed to a mental institution, or any person who has asserted a defense of not guilty by reason of insanity or mental defect in a criminal proceeding.
- h. Any person who is or has been a subject of an incompetency proceeding, the result of which may prohibit the possession of a

firearm.

- i. Any person who, having been a citizen of the United States, has renounced his/her citizenship.
 - j. Any person who is a fugitive from justice.
- k. Any person who is an alien illegally in the United States or under a non-immigrant visa.
- I. Any person who is subject to a court order that restrains that person from harassing, stalking, or threatening an intimate partner or child of an intimate partner.

There are certain places where you cannot carry a firearm, concealed or otherwise, even with a Concealed Carry permit, to include but not limited to;

On the private property of another if you are denied permission or if the owner has posted "No Firearms Allowed".

On a School Campus or School sponsored event.

In a Municipal or County meeting with Mayors. Council Members, Commissioners, etc.

In a Courthouse or where Municipal, County, State or Federal Court Proceedings are held.

At a Public Demonstration.

In an establishment whose primary purpose is to serve alcohol.

In a business which has posted "No Firearms Allowed".
